

He never exaggerates. You won't find any giant 100 foot waves in his writing, but he's been there, so he knows. He circumnavigated in an 18 foot open boat, rounded the Horn solo and, on his fifth round-the-world trip, re-entered the Western Hemisphere by way of the Cape of Good Hope.If you've been to sea, professionally or as an amateur, you won't be able tturn out and go to sleep.
